

Remote Learning-What will happen if your child has to self-isolate or their bubble closes.

Once you have been notified that your child's bubble needs to be closed or you inform us that your child has to self-isolate and therefore your child cannot be in school, you will receive an email from your child's class teacher regarding remote learning.

1. You will be sent a **home learning planning framework** of the lessons your child will need to do. This is because much of the maths and English curriculum needs to be done in sequence with easier tasks leading up to a more challenging one. *The timetable will contain teaching for most of the normal planned curriculum.* Initially this may only be a few days' work until we know how long your child will be absent for.

2. On the home learning framework there are **links to remote provision** for new and scaffolded teaching. These links will be in the form of video clips, powerpoint presentations, Oak National Academy resources as well as other resources. *These will not be live as we understand the pressures of home schooling and working from home particularly if you have more than one child to cater for.* If your child has an EHCP then alternative live remote provision may be put in place in order for them to continue to access their interventions.

3. **Work to be completed** – For each lesson the children will have a task to complete. The tasks will come in a variety of forms:
 - Online such as mymaths and bug club. These will be monitored remotely by the class teacher at the time so feedback and supplementary work can be given accordingly;
 - Worksheets;
 - Quizzes;
 - Practical tasks;
 - Paper jottings/diagrams in preparation for a more challenging task;
 - A longer challenge task which the teacher may ask you to submit via email or bring into school once the children are back in.

4. **Communication and feedback.** This will obviously depend on how long your child is off for.
 - If they are only off for a few days, then the work will be vital for them to know what the rest of the class have done whilst they have been self-isolating and be at the same point as their peers. Feedback will then take place at school.
 - If it is longer than a few days, the teachers will be sending emails to the pupils and responding to their and your emails in order to monitor pupil engagement. The teachers will feedback on children's work that is submitted online and through emails, this may be via a phone call, by email or through MyMaths and Bug Club.
