- In year 3 the children have been extremely busy learning all about the Celts. They took part in an exciting celtic workshop, looking at artefacts, making their own clay pots and even preparing for battle. Year 3 also had a forest school 'Life as a Celt' experience day where they carried out challenging den building and toasting bread over the camp fire.
- In English, we have been exploring a range of fairy-tales, myths, legends and fables. The
 children have created their own mythical creatures and have been able to describe their
 creatures with great detail.

• In Year 4 we looked at Oliver Twist for musical week. We learned the song "Food Glorious Food" and had fun decorating some white t shirts in order to look like dirty, unkempt orphans.

We made clay geckos in DT and decorated these with bright colours. We found making the arms and legs difficult as it was very fiddly and we needed to ensure they were not too thin as they would have cracked and fallen off!

Year Five celebrated Musicals week by learning about musical, Joseph and the Amazing
Technicolour Dream coat. We made a coat of many colours by decorating squares of material
with hieroglyphs and attached them so that the coat looked really colourful. We learned to
sing the song 'Any Dream will do' from the musical.

Amongst many other activities we did a drama of the story and made board games based on the story. The finale of the week was when we presented our song to the rest of the school.



• In the Spring term, Year 6 studied poems from Lewis Carrol and Maya Angelou with a focus on themes and figurative language. Children also studied the Titanic and wrote fantastic newspaper reports on the tragic event. In science, we started our Electricity unit where children have deepened their knowledge of circuits and safety. In PE, children learned about balancing, mirroring and manoeuvring in different ways to create shapes and patterns in the Gymnastics unit. In History, we continued to learn about WW2 with a focus on rationing and the roles of women. In the Musicals week, children had a blast learning about The Lion King, animals and countries located in Africa and performing their song and dance to 'I Just Can't Wait to Be King'.

With all this amazing reading going on at Engayne, and with World Book Day just around the corner on 2nd March ...what better time to give you another parental reading tip to grow a love of reading.

Reading doesn't have to be all about fiction

For lots of children who haven't yet fallen in love with reading, it could be because they haven't been offered the right books. Some children just don't get excited by magical worlds and fantasy adventures. Some children prefer reading facts and information. And some children enjoy both.

There is a common misperception that you are only 'a reader' if you read fictional books; that non-fiction doesn't count as 'proper' reading. And this perception can be incredibly damaging to a child's relationship with books and reading.

Well-meaning parents are often keen for their child to become engrossed in Harry potter or riveted by Roald Dahl but the harder you push a child towards books they don't want to read, the louder they proclaim that they DON'T LIKE READING!

An important factor in reading for pleasure is choice; you can't force someone to get enjoyment out of reading! If your child isn't being offered the books they enjoy, they won't want to read.

So the 'way in' to reading for all children must be through what interests them most. But sometimes this gets a bit skewed. You shouldn't, for example, automatically assume that a child who likes playing football will enjoy fictional stories about a football team. They might however, enjoy reading about the history of their favourite football club – but they might not know that such a book exists.

So how do you work out what your child wants to read?

Offer them books with wide-ranging content such as Andy Seed's <u>'The Silly Book of Side-Splitting Stuff'</u> or Adam Frost's <u>'The Epic Book of Epicness'</u> and see what sparks an interest.

Try a book of factual short stories such as 'How to be Extraordinary' by Rashmi Sirdeshpande. Or Jenny Alexander's factual stories, facts and ideas in 'How Can I Help the World?'.

Or what about books from <u>National Geographic Kids</u>? They contain short articles, stories, facts and quizzes ranging from science to geography to the human body and animals.

These types of books have the advantage of allowing you to 'dip in and out' therefore feel less demanding than having to focus on an entire 'story'. The more variety you offer your child in smaller more manageable chunks of reading, the more chance they have to find something they enjoy. Fiction, non-fiction, factual story, poetry, fact books, comics and joke books are all legitimate forms of reading material. If your child is choosing to read any of these then they are reading for pleasure. And down the line that factual interest in volcanoes may lead to them choosing to read a fictional story about volcanoes. But if it doesn't, that's ok, reading non-fiction is still reading!





STAFF NEWS


